# The Toastmaster Greeting Statement in Your Speech

After you have completed your Ice Breaker speech, plan to include in your 2<sup>nd</sup> and later speeches, the Toastmaster Greeting Statement ("Mr. Toastmaster, fellow Toastmasters, and welcome guests [if present]"). However, don't use the greeting as the first thing you say. Instead, use an interesting, compelling speech opening that captures the attention and mind of your audience. Once that is done, then you can deliver the greeting statement and continue with your speech.

The first words you speak in your speech give you the opportunity to grab your audience and get them interested in what you have to say. Starting out with something like "It's nice to be here today" or the Toastmaster Greeting Statement does not capture the interest of the audience. Instead, such statements direct the audience's attention elsewhere and make it harder to get them interested in what you are saying. Instead, use one of the many available speech opening techniques to catapult your audience right into the speech topic. Then, pause to do the greeting statement and continue your speech.

Here is an example of one of my early speeches in which I will show the Toastmaster Greeting Statement as the very first statement and then I will show the greeting being delayed until after the opening.

and

### === With 'Greeting' statement delayed until after the opening (Recommended) ===

You can see that in the 2<sup>nd</sup> part of the example, the speech opening immediately immerses the audience in the speech topic. They will be thinking about possible answers to the questions, getting interested in learning more, and anticipating the direction the speech will take. After a strong opening, pausing to greet everyone is courteous and helps establish rapport with the audience. But at that point, the greeting does not divert their thoughts away from you speech topic.

After watching many speech contests in our district, I realized that all the better speakers were delaying the Toastmaster Greeting Statement and getting good results. So give this approach a try in your next speech.
